LAO LAO Comments

- We Recommend the Legislature Consider How to Prepare for the Next Downturn. Reserves are the most important tool the budget has to prepare for a recession and have increased notably in recent years. However, the budget has other tools including, for example, paying down debts and one-time spending.
- We Recommend the Legislature Adopt an Overall Level of Reserves Higher Than the Governor's Level. The Assembly adopts a higher level of reserves.
- We Recommend Focusing Debt Repayments on Purposes That Prepare for the Future. For example, the Senate's plan to pay down the unfunded liability of the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) and the Assembly's plan to pay down district unfunded liability for CalPERS.
