

Costs of College Attendance



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Food and Housing Largest Cost of Attendance (COA) for Most Students

■ Tuition and fees at the California Community Colleges (CCC), California State University (CSU), and University of California (UC) are about 5 percent, 25 percent, and 45 percent, respectively, of a typical student's COA. (These charges are often more than two-thirds of a student's COA at a private college.)


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Costs Vary Across and Within Public Segments

- Average COA ranges from about \$18,000 at CCC to \$29,000 at UC.
- Costs also vary within each segment due to local costs of living. For example, the average COA at CSU Monterey Bay is about \$20,000 while the average COA at Sonoma State is nearly \$26,000.



Aid Programs Help Financially Needy Students Cover These Costs



Most Students Receive Some Form of Financial Aid

More than 70 percent of CSU students, more than 55 percent of UC students, and about 40 percent of CCC students receive some form of need-based financial aid.

Federal, State, and Institutional Financial Aid Programs

- In 2011-12, federal aid programs provided \$2.8 billion in grants to more than 750,000 students at CCC, CSU, and UC.
- In the same year, campuses provided \$1.8 billion in grants and tuition/fee waivers to about 1.2 million California students.
- The state's Cal Grant program provided \$1.2 billion in grants to 211,000 students in our public segments.

Families Submit Information on Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

 The federal Department of Education determines Expected Family Contribution.

Campuses Determine Eligibility for Pell Grants, Other Federal Aid, and Institutional Aid Based on Financial Need

- Pell Grants provide up to \$5,550 toward COA. Other federal aid awarded by campuses includes supplemental grants, work-study, and federal loans.
- Institutional aid generally covers tuition and fees, ranging from \$46 per unit at CCC to \$12,192 at UC.

The California Student Aid Commission Determines Cal Grant Eligibility

 Most Cal Grant and institutional aid awards have same function: cover tuition and fees.



Cal Grants Awards and Eligibility Criteria



Three Main Types of Cal Grant Awards

- Entitlement awards.
- Competitive awards.
- Awards for occupational, technical, and vocational programs.



Entitlement Awards Guaranteed for Eligible Students

Entitlement Program Requirements—New Applicants

Program	Criteria
High School Entitlement Cal Grant A	 3.0 high school GPA \$83,100 income ceiling (family of four) Application by March 2 of year graduated high school or following year
High School Entitlement Cal Grant B	 2.0 high school GPA \$43,700 income ceiling (family of four) Application by March 2 of year graduated high school or following year
Transfer Entitlement Cal Grant A and B	 2.4 college GPA Income ceilings correspond to A and B above Transfer from CCC to baccalaureate institution Under age 28 as of December 31 of first award year



Cal Grants Awards and Eligibility Criteria (Continued)



To Qualify for Any of These Cal Grant Awards, a Student Must:

- Be a California resident.
- Be a U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen.
- Meet U.S. selective service requirements.
- Attend a qualifying postsecondary institution.
- Be enrolled at least half time.
- Maintain satisfactory academic progress.
- Not be in default on any student loan.
- Not owe any federal or state grant refund.
- Not have assets in excess of \$64,300.



Cal Grant Awards and Amounts Differ by Segment



Cal Grants for Students at Public Institutions

- Students at UC primarily receive Cal Grant A awards covering full tuition (\$12,192) for four years.
- Students at CSU primarily receive Cal Grant B awards including access grants, or stipends, of \$1,473 each year and full tuition coverage of \$5,472 after the first year.
- Students at CCC primarily receive Cal Grant B access awards. These students also receive CCC fee waivers (about \$1,100 annually for a full-time student).



Cal Grants for Students at Private Institutions

- Students at private nonprofit institutions primarily receive Cal Grant A awards contributing up to \$9,223 toward tuition for four years.
- Students at private for-profit institutions can receive Cal Grant A awards (contributing \$9,223 toward tuition each year), Cal Grant B awards (providing access awards annually and tuition funds after the first year), or Cal Grant C awards (providing up to \$2,462 for occupational or technical training and \$547 for books and supplies).





Cal Grants and the State Budget



- Cal Grant Growth Accelerated in Recent Years
- Participation Has Grown by 30 Percent Since 2007-08
- Expenditures Have Doubled During This Period
- Public University Tuition Has Been Major Cost Driver



A Look Back at Major Cal Grant Policy and Budget Actions



Few Major Policy Changes Between 1955 and 2011

- New program components added in 1968 and 1973.
- Converted from competitive to entitlement program effective 2001-02.

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Major Budget Actions in 2011 and 2012

- Required students to recertify income and assets (in addition to financial need) annually and increased minimum need threshold.
 - Corrected unintended consequence by allowing co-eligible Cal Grant B recipients to switch to Cal Grant A awards.
- Limited institutional eligibility based on student outcomes (cohort default rate and graduation rate).
- Reduced maximum award amounts for students with Cal Grant B access awards, Cal Grant C awards, and Cal Grant A and B awards at private nonprofit and for-profit colleges through Governor's veto.
- Further reduced maximum award amounts for students at private nonprofit and for-profit schools beginning in 2013-14 (see figure on the next page).
- Transferred \$804 million in federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families funds from CalWORKs to Cal Grants, offsetting a like amount of General Fund costs. This transfer had no programmatic effect on Cal Grants.

b Maximum award amounts at public universities continue to cover full systemwide tuition and fees as established by the universities' respective governing boards. As of March 2013, these amounts are \$5,472 for CSU and \$12,192 for UC.
