_AO Role in Initiative Process

Fiscal Analysis Prior to Signature Collection.

- State law requires our office, alongside the Department of Finance, to prepare an impartial fiscal analysis of each initiative.
- State law requires this analysis to provide an estimate of the measure's fiscal impact on state and local governments.
- A summary of the estimate fiscal impact is included on petitions that are circulated for signatures.

Analysis After Measure Receives Sufficient Signatures to Qualify for the Ballot.

- State law requires our office to provide impartial analyses of all statewide ballot propositions for the statewide voter information guide.
- This analysis includes a description of the measure and its fiscal effects.
- We are currently in the process of preparing these materials.



Provisions of Proposed Initiative

- Legislature Would Have to Wait 72 Hours After Posting a Bill (Including Amendments) on the Internet Before It Could Pass That Bill.
 - This rule has exemptions for emergencies, including natural disasters.
- Videos of All of the Legislature's Public Meetings Would Have to Be Recorded, and Then Posted and Stored on the Internet.
 - These videos would have to be available on the Internet within 24 hours following the end of the meeting.
 - These videos would have to be downloadable for at least 20 years.

■ Other Provisions:

- Members of the public would be allowed to record and broadcast any part of a public meeting.
- Amends state statute to provide that anyone could use videos of legislative public meetings for any legitimate purpose and without paying a fee to the state.
- The Legislature's costs of complying with these requirements would be counted within the Legislature's annual spending limit.



Fiscal Effects of Proposed Initiative

- Costs of Recording and Storing Videos of Public Meetings.
 - One-time costs of \$1 million to \$2 million to buy cameras and other equipment.
 - Ongoing costs of about \$1 million dollars for more staff and online storage for videos.
