Governor's Proposal

- ☒ Governor proposes to decentralize administration of Cal Grants.
- ☒ Public higher education segments, instead of California Student Aid Commission (CSAC), would administer entitlement program.
- ☒ The California Community College (CCC) Chancellor's Office would administer competitive program for all sectors, and entitlement for students at nonpublic institutions.
- ☒ Proposal would eliminate duplication in award process.



Main Steps in Cal Grant Delivery Process

California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) Award Process

- Student files Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
- High school or college submits grade point average (GPA) form.
- CSAC matches FAFSA and GPA, checks prior awards, determines eligibility.
- CSAC notifies student, and campus indicated on FAFSA of eligibility.

Campus Award Process (Concurrent)

- Campus receives FAFSA for students it has admitted.
- Campus builds financial aid package for student with federal grants, estimated or preliminary Cal Grant, other gift aid, institutional grants, student loans, and work-study awards.
- Student receives financial aid offer from campus.
- If Cal Grant award does not match CSAC notice, students, campus financial aid staff, and CSAC work to resolve discrepancies.
- Campus verifies eligibility for enrolled students.
- CSAC pays campus.
- Campus pays student's fees, and/or issues check for access award.

Audit and Reconciliation

- Student rosters used to communicate between CSAC and campus.
- Extensive financial reconciliation process for advances and subsequent payments.
- Audit of eligibility documentation and financial accounting.



Policy Questions



Would Decentralization Improve Service to Students?

- Campus would be one-stop shop for students.
- Would reduce duplicate and conflicting information to students.
- Financial aid offers from campuses would be more definitive, though still subject to verification of student information.



Would Decentralization Limit Choices for Students?

- Cal Grants would remain fully portable.
- Students would receive offers from all institutions to which they were accepted.
- A student who did not apply or was not accepted at any institution would not receive an award offer.



Would Decentralization Improve Overall Efficiency of Grant Delivery?

- Reducing duplication would improve the efficiency of the award process.
- Some steps in the delivery process are more efficiently performed centrally. These include tracking utilization and remaining eligibility, statewide reporting, and maintaining grade point average (GPA) data.
- Some functions, such as audit, must be performed centrally for accountability purposes.



Policy Questions

(Continued)



What Alternatives Should Be Considered?

- Change program requirements to improve efficiency of award process.
- Decentralize some functions, maintain others at the state level.



Other Considerations

- Some of the roles proposed for the Chancellor's Office are outside the mission of the CCC.
- Implementation would require lead time and campuses would incur costs but initial costs would be outweighed by long-term savings.
- Decentralization discussion moot if Legislature approves May Revision proposals to phase out Cal Grants.



LAO Recommendation

- ☒ Implement partial decentralization of Cal Grants permitting campus financial aid offices to approve entitlement awards for eligible students but maintaining several central functions at CSAC or its successor organization.
- ☒ Establish a just-in-time funding model for Cal Grants.
- ☒ Consider statutory changes in requirements for Cal Grants to streamline administration of awards while preserving the intent of the financial aid programs.
